Metropolitan Musical Theatre Company Monteverdi Singers I've just started reading an interesting and fascinating book. It's <u>Australian Religious Thought</u>, written by Wayne Hudson and published by Monash University Press in 2016. I'm not very far into it as yet but, so far, it's easy to read and quite insightful.

In essence, Hudson argues that despite the popularly cultivated image of Australia as a secular, hedonistic and religiously indifferent society the facts tell us



otherwise. There has been, in our own backyard, much original and diverse thinking about religion, much interesting stuff published in papers rather than books, much influence on public life and not all of it in a Christian context.

I found myself wondering why this is. Of course, Wayne Hudson will have his own explanation for this and I will be interested to discover it. In the meantime I wondered whether there isn't a lesson here which could be useful to us during Lent as we prepare for Easter. (Easter Day, by the way, is Sunday, April 16^{th})

Already, a common thread in Hudson's discussion is the insight that when it comes to religious and theological discussions in Australia they have often occurred in a cocoon with little or no engagement with those on the outside. They've largely been "inhouse" discussions.

Contemporary social commentators tell us that that is what is happening to us today on a much wider scale as more and more people use the internet as their social network. The way Facebook and many other social networks are set up, we automatically get news, and advertisements, from people and groups that appear to share our values and interests or from people and groups whose online pages we tend to visit frequently. And we also get shielded from people and groups who do not appear to be on our personal wavelength. So, most of the time, our online conversations are with people we agree with and the result is that we do not hear news or opinions that contradict our views and we certainly do not get to engage with people who hold very different views to our own. The end result is a much more fragmented and belligerent society where hate, contempt, ridicule and conceit become the order of the day.

When we think about Jesus' final journey to Jerusalem, and our Lenten journey as we walk with him to the Holy City, it is clearly a journey where some people heard what Jesus was on about and engaged with him, while others, despite their protestations, never did hear what he was saying to them and certainly had no intention of engaging with him. They put him to death.

There is a risk in engagement with Jesus, or any other person for that matter, and that is that we may need to reform our life or give up status or wealth or power in the process of being genuinely open to another person, another human being. So many people in Australia today say that they "hear" the cry of indigenous people, or the cry of refugees and asylum seekers, or the cry of the mentally ill, or the cry of the sexually abused, to name just a few categories, but they find that they cannot really offer help because they do not want to do so by becoming worse off in some way! Understandable, perhaps, but sad, none the less.

What, then, might we give up for Lent? Perhaps one of the best things we could give up is the safety of the cocoons in which we live and venture outside to meet and *engage* with people whose life experience is different to ours, whose religious faith is different to ours, whose tragedies are different to ours. Of course, there is a risk to all of this. Your life may change forever. It could be enriched beyond your wildest dreams. But, then again, you may end up crucified on a cross in the Holy City. That's the risk Jesus took for you and me. Will we take it for him?
