MINISTERIAL MEANDERING

I was watching a documentary on World War 1 and they were talking about the Spanish Flu Pandemic which took control of the world in the months following the war. The pandemic of 1918 was the deadliest in history, infecting an



estimated 500 million people (about one third of the planet's population), and is estimated to have killed between 20 and 50 million.

The first recorded observations of the 1918 flu were documented in the United States, France, Germany and the United Kingdom. To maintain morale, the World War 1 censors minimized these early reports. Newspapers were free to report in neutral Spain and these reports gave the false impression of Spain being especially hard hit. This gave rise to the name "Spanish Flu". It soon spread around the world.

At that time, there were no effective drugs or vaccines to treat this killer flu strain.

Citizens were ordered to wear masks; schools, theatres and businesses were shuttered and bodies piled up in makeshift morgues before the virus ended its deadly global march.



Australia was not immune to the virus and

many of the "Diggers" who returned home died from the virus after having survived the war. Approximately 15,000 Australians died from Spanish Flu at a time when the country's population was only about five million.



Spanish Flu quarantine camp on Jubilee Oval in Adelaide When the virus spread to South Australia from Victoria, our borders were closed suddenly and a number of people holidaying in Melbourne found themselves stranded. Here in Adelaide, a quarantine camp was set up on Jubilee Oval adjacent to the River Torrens and returning soldiers were quarantined on Torrens Island.

It reminds us that we must do everything we can to follow the

government guidelines to remain COVID-Safe here in South Australia so that we don't have to deal with the problems that Victoria is facing at the moment. It is surely much better to put up with a few restrictions than to face a second wave of the infection.

So let's stay COVID-Safe!

HOLY COMMUNION

The Church Council has decided that we will celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion on **Sunday 2^{nd} August**.

It will vary from our usual procedure in the following manner. The ministers will sanitise their hands prior to commencement. The process will be intinction using wafers and a chalice of grape juice.

For distribution the ministers will stand in front of the communion table and recipients will be invited to come forward from one side of the church at a time. Recipients are asked to maintain a distance of 1.5m during this process.

As each recipient approaches the minister they will be passed a wafer and the recipient will then dip the wafer into the chalice. After receiving communion, recipients should return to their seat via the other aisle.

The elements will be brought to any members who are not mobile.

USE OF INDIVIDUAL COMMUNION CUPS



Interestingly, the practice of using individual communion cups can be traced back to the early 1900's when people became more aware of the risk of spreading disease via shared surfaces and particularly after the Spanish Flu Pandemic in 1919.
