FROM THE MINISTER

LIVING IN A TIME OF UNCERTAINTY

Have you noticed that there are so many contrasting responses to living in the new world of a global pandemic? It depends so much on personal circumstances. There are those who have lost loved ones. Others have had to deal with the dire



consequences of lost income, business failure or the restrictions for significant occasions such as funerals and weddings. In contrast some have delighted in taking time out during a lockdown and have been glad to work at home. For all however there is the need to adjust to living in a world of uncertainty and subject to accepting necessary restrictions. Recently we at Wesley Kent Town had to adapt our worship. For example, not being able to sing and even not gathering at all.

One saying that I have lived with is "my situation is never my problem". I know that does not sound very comforting at present. But the saying went on to add that the real problem is actually "how I relate to my situation." This insight has led to a whole school of therapy called "reality therapy" designed to help people to come to terms with painful realities over which they have limited or no control.

Is this not the challenge we all have to face? When to decide that situations ought to be changed because they can be or ought to be: and when to accept that there is nothing that can be done about a situation. If circumstances are really unchangeable then what are the choices? They range from denying reality, accepting stoically or accepting gracefully, despite having to live with discomfort or pain. Here I am reminded of the serenity prayer, written by the great Protestant Theologian Reinhold Niebuhr.



God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change; courage to change the things I can; and wisdom to know the difference.

Accepting given reality requires a humility that ought not diminish a sense of self-worth and dignity. John Powell talks of the importance of not running away from our discomfort. He suggests that we can enter into our discomfort profitably, not just by finding the source of our discomfort, but also by asking "How can I look at myself and my situation differently?" Then it becomes a matter of attitude.

The great gift of the experience of grace is that it enables us to claim our freedom to decide that nothing on earth (or in heaven!) can ever take away our humanity. Is this not also disclosed by Jesus dying on a cross?

The appearance of the Delta strain of this virus in South Australia forced us into a one week lockdown so that both the planned Spring Concert scheduled for 21st July and the Sunday Worship Service on the 25th July had to be

cancelled at short notice. This was a disappointment but we are grateful that our State Government acted swiftly to get on top of this outbreak and keep us safe.

We were permitted to gather for worship on 1st August but the decision was made to not hold a gathered Worship Service that Sunday as an added precaution.

We extend grateful thanks to Rev Mac Macdonald and Rev Dr Jonathan Barker for providing "Worship at Home" material for Jenny Stewart to collate and email home to all who have email addresses. We sincerely hope that you find this material spiritually beneficial and that it is helping us stay connected as a worshipping community.

Please check you emails each week because this is the most efficient means of communicating any changes to our worship arrangements.

Restrictions have been eased so that we have returned to the 1 person/2 m^2 rule but for the time being:



- Masks must be worn indoors
- No congregational singing is permitted
- People must be seated while eating and drinking during morning tea. Please take a seat and you will be served.

Unfortunately we are also not permitted to have a choir at present so this means no choir practices as well. We all miss the singing and hope that it will soon be deemed safe enough to resume.

There are no plans for further concerts this year at the moment because of the uncertainty regarding Government COVID restrictions. If the situation improves later in the year further consideration will be given to their reintroduction.
