FROM THE MINISTER

Early in June I attended the national conference of the Uniting Church's Historical Society, held at the Centre for Ministry in North Parramatta, NSW. The theme was "Growing up Uniting" featuring the stories, experiences and learnings of those who have been formed in the Uniting church rather than as Methodists, Presbyterians or Congregationalists. In these days of declining numbers and uncertainty about the future it is good to affirm that



which characterises the Uniting Church forty-four years since its inauguration in 1997. We have made mistakes, followed some unhelpful paths leading to dead ends, and not always provided good, transparent, informed decisions, but we are human, flawed, striving, hopeful. But what characterises us contributes to a unique witness among the churches of Australia. Let me share the following quoting a contribution of Rev Dr John Squires from Canberra.

"At the very beginning, the "Statement to the Nation" made headlines in the press, and we have been led to develop a clear identity and carve out a distinctive place within Australian society. We have a distinctively open and unconstricted theology, faithful to our reformed and evangelical heritage, but contextualised to the contemporary Australian situation. We celebrate multicultural and linguistic diversity and exhibit a warm acceptance of LGBTIQ+ people. We are strongly committed to social justice, advocate for refugees, work to effect better housing policies, argue against gambling addiction in society, decriminalising drug usage, and other issues.

We have thoroughgoing commitment to living sustainably, honouring creation, and working with organisations devoted to environmental care. We have an enduring covenant with the First Peoples of the land, an openness to ecumenical and interfaith engagements, and a strong commitment to mission in other countries that means working carefully with partner churches and supporting local initiatives. In each of these areas, we have ideals, goals, visions, and we have dashed hopes, failed enterprises, inadequate realisations. Yet we press on.

We still talk with orthodox, catholic, conservative, evangelical and pentecostal siblings, but don't feel constrained by their dogmas or traditions, or by what we perceive to be their restrictions and limitations. We seek to set out in fresh directions, following untested pathways, sailing into unchartered waters, knowing that this means pushing the envelope, risking being criticised or unfriended or worse. Sometimes the fresh initiatives work well, sometimes they fail spectacularly. But at least we try—and we press on."

I have often heard from many non-churchgoers, "If I went to church, it would be to a Uniting Church". Well, it's OK not to go to church and for us to work with others in community projects of mutual interest. But one consistent observation

at the History Conference was that so many in the UCA are just so diffident about witnessing to the faith that moves them. I wonder whether this might be the greatest challenge we face to be able to rearticulate the gospel in order to lead people (non-judgementally) into fuller experience of life and community. In my experience, new energy always flows when we refresh ourselves with the basics of the Christian faith as it may apply to living in the realities of the 21st century.


NEWS OF OUR PEOPLE
