FROM THE MINISTER

REVISITING THE STORY OF DAVID - A FLAWED BIBLICAL HERO

During June and July, Sundays at Wesley Kent Town will feature key episodes of the great Biblical Saga of David. We shall seek to tease out how this archetypical story can speak to our life and times. In my childhood, King David was a Biblical hero. His defeat of Goliath was a powerful metaphor for facing life's challenges. A "nobody" defeats the powerful one. Later I understood how David became the prototype of Messiahship: a gifted shepherding leader, who is chosen to inaugurate the kingdom of justice and peace. As we retell the stories we shall ask, "How may this great but flawed leader enable us to navigate pathways through the complex social and political dilemmas of the 21st century?"



And personally, "How do we maintain our integrity and our identity as disciples of Christ in a world of such uncertainty and ambiguity?"

In mentioning David's flaws it is worth noting that the biblical record actually amalgamated at least two versions of the David story: one which intends to praise him; the other which stresses his flaws and oppressive policies. For example, David's relationship with women was particularly problematic. He married Saul's daughter Michal who dearly loved him, but later spurned him when he leapt and danced almost naked before the ark of the covenant. And we certainly cannot ignore David's affair with Bathsheba which took place while his troops were dying in his wars. When Bathsheba became pregnant, David brought back her husband, Uriah, from the wars to sleep with her. However Uriah refused to do so while his fellow soldiers were still camping in open fields. To save his own neck, David plotted to have Uriah removed by sending him back to the battlefield and putting him in the front lines so he'd be killed. Did he get away with it? No, Nathan the prophet caught him out with a simple parable about a shepherd cheated of his flock of sheep.

Yet the messianic movement attributed to Jesus the titles and functions assigned to David giving rise to the idea of a mediator able to reconcile the gulf of estrangement between others, ourselves and God. Retelling this story may enable us to see how David displayed deep insights necessary to deal with complex situations. He possessed the knack of finding solutions to immediate problems while being able to inspire a nation to achieve long-range aims. The whole question of the ethics of power is central. There is so much food for thought. Besides which, the saga is filled with "ripping" good yarns! They may also give rise to interpretations that we never learned in Sunday School.

TARTAN SUNDAY HISTORY

Three million Australians are either Scottish or of Scottish descent. International Tartan Day in Australia is celebrated on a local basis in most states on July 1, the anniversary of the Repeal Proclamation of 1782, annulling the Act of Proscription of 1747, which made wearing tartan an offence punishable with up to seven years' transportation. The Act of Proscription, passed in 1746 following the defeat of the Jacobites at the battle of Culloden in April 1745, was 'An act for the more effectual disarming the highlands of Scotland; and for the more effectual securing the peace of the said highlands; and for restraining the use of the highland dress'. It banned the wearing of Highland Dress except by the military. It didn't ban tartan cloth per se but, because the Highlander was forced into Lowland Dress, the everyday link with tartan was irrevocably severed which resulted in a later perception that tartan itself was banned.
