

FROM THE MINISTER

Recently I recalled something from my youth group days in the church. A wise mentor said when reading the Gospels, it is always good to ask, "What is the good news here? If we can name it for us personally or together, then it is probably the leading of the Holy Spirit." I found myself asking, "what is the good news" as we considered the deep discomfort found in the Gospel



according to Mark chapter 7 where he paints a disturbing picture of a Jesus casting a derogatory slur on a gentile woman who comes to him for help? It seems entirely out of character for Jesus, the Christ of compassion and mercy. It is not just rudeness, for his words justify ethnic boundaries and degrade a vulnerable woman. In response she says, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." I also hear her asking, "Is this good news?"

Jesus relents, changes tack and heals the woman's daughter. He responds not to her *pistis* (faith) but to her *logos* (reasoning). The Syrophoenician woman detected an inconsistency and named the same troubling discomfort we all sense with this story. Instead of reading it as a power struggle, of someone winning and someone losing an argument, to ask "is this good news" may help us understand this passage as an early example of the "priesthood of all believers." The woman offers the story of her resistance, her reasoning that Jesus has not yet proclaimed good news. She isn't there to make a point. She needs her daughter to be healed, and she knows that Jesus can do it. Jesus receives her discernment of the "good news." He recognises that the word he has delivered belongs now to her, to gentiles, to the world. Yes, this sounds like the "priesthood of all believers." Discerning the essence of the "good news" is not just the task of rabbis or ordained preachers but is something to be done by the whole community of Christ.

The Syrophoenician woman also offers Jesus a reminder that there is enough good news for everyone. This literally happened in the feeding of the crowds just before Jesus goes to Tyre, with the disciples recovering 12 baskets of surplus. This exchange between Jesus and the Syrophoenician woman is an act of abundance, too. Even Jesus is not left to identify the "good news" alone. If the incarnate Jesus welcomes others to be priests with him, to discern the presence of God's Spirit working among us, how much more do we need one another for the task of discerning the gospel? The God who has set us down together has also given us to one another: to speak the word, to proclaim together the "good news" of Jesus Christ.

Rev Alex Rodgers reports that his health is much improved and he is making a good recovery following the stroke he suffered in January this year.


