

## LET THE JOURNEY BEGIN!

### Reflections on the meaning of Lent

In a sense we have been observing a kind of Lent ever since March 2020 when the World Health Organisation officially declared the Covid 19 virus to be a global pandemic! Why? In the Middle Ages, ships arriving in Venice from infected ports were required to sit at anchor for 40 days before landing, in quarantine. This word is derived from Italian, quaranta giorni which means 40 days. First used in the English language in 1663, it was the 40 days during which persons who might spread the plague were isolated from the rest of the community. However, while this may be very interesting, it is good to recall that the 40 days of Lent was traditionally to do with Jesus' journey to the climactic event of his dying on a cross and the resurrection. What are its origins?

Lent well illustrates the ever-changing nature of church customs and liturgies. Originally there was no Lent or even Good Friday in the church - only Easter Day, on which both death and resurrection were firmly held together. Then quite early, Easter became the day for Baptisms (still a custom in some churches). As preparation candidates underwent three days of fasting leading up to Easter Day. This was the origin of Good Friday - a journey from cross to resurrection. Everyone fasted for three days along with the baptismal candidates. In time this was extended to 40 days linking it with the journey of Jesus, which began with his fasting in the desert as a preparation for his ministry.

In the middle-ages, priestly dominance led to an over-emphasis on penitence, so Lent became a penitential season. Even though the Protestant Reformers thought this was overdone, (they shifted the emphasis back to Easter Day) they restored the emphasis on the journey to the cross while retaining a modified emphasis on penitence by encouraging "self-denial" so beloved in the later Methodist tradition.

I would like to suggest that the motif of JOURNEY is still a good way of making sense of Lent for today. Lent can be a good time to put us in touch with aspects of our personal journeys with which we often struggle. For example, the struggle:

- with priorities over and against so many demands
- with being disciplined while affirming the flowering of human experience
- with taking proper care of ourselves but being available for others
- with being attached to things or nostalgic about the past and having to "let go"

One way of reflecting on our own journey is to use characters that made their way with Jesus such as Peter, Mary Magdalene, James and John – or to identify with modern day pilgrims like Martin Luther King Jr, Mother Teresa or Nelson Mandela.

This year as you reflect on your own life's journey, consider who has inspired you on the way? Who do you walk with now? Dare to name life struggles which require new decisions! What is required to reinvigorate your response to the call to journey with Jesus as the way, truth and life? The Sundays leading up to Easter are a great opportunity to reflect on your pilgrimage, as our Sunday services will again trace the journey of Jesus to the cross and its amazing aftermath. Let your Lenten Journey begin!
