FROM THE MINISTER

Stories bind us together

Within the last year, as part of a bedtime routine, my younger son Levi has been asking for 'a story of when I was younger'. Sometimes they are short, and other times they go longer depending on the time of night. I've found that I can think of a story the boys



haven't heard most nights. Levi loves the stories and enjoys asking questions to stretch out his night before he must sleep.

Not all of us are story tellers but we all have a story to tell. My dad worked mostly in the Accident and Emergency area in our local hospital. He would come home from work and have a story to share about something that had happened in the day. He would also tell stories of working on the family farm when he was younger. I think I learned a lot about how to string a story together and stretch the truth to make it more interesting.

Our stories shape us, but they also inform others about who we are and where we have come from. It's why we remember stories in the Old Testament, Jesus' parables and the Gospel story, because they capture our attention, and we learn and apply them in our own lives.

As we gather in community, we bring our stories with us, and we can learn from each other. We understand more of our God and the world in which we live when we listen to the stories that surround us, the story of the First Peoples, the stories of migrants and asylum seekers who now call this country home and woven into all our stories is God's story; The story of love, sacrifice, redemption and hope.

The power of our own personal story should never be underestimated. We now know from science that when we hear a story, our bodies produces a hormone called oxytocin. We instantly start to form a connection with the person we are listening to. Stories bind us together and help us make sense of our experience. We are all meant to be in community so we can share our stories whether good or bad.

1 Peter 3:15 says, "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have." Or in other words, 'be ready to share your story'. We all are on a journey with God, we all need a hope to hold on to. Whatever age you are, stories hold wisdom if we turn our ear to listen. Wisdom can come from the most unlikely of sources, no matter what age. Your story has wisdom which needs to be shared.

So, embrace your own story and share more of it with the world. You make the world a better place when you do.
