FROM THE MINISTER

I write this as one of the last tasks I need to attend to before I head off for a week with over 550 adolescents who are involved in the Australian Army Cadets (AAC) program here in South Australia. It is that time of year, the first week of the October school holidays, when they gather at the army training area east of Murray Bridge for the Annual Field Exercise (AFX). The AAC is a youth



development program for High school aged young people – 12 to 18 years old.

Predominantly, the youngest of these are the recruit cadets. They are new to the program, some of whom will have only joined in the last couple of months. This will be their first AFX. For other cadets who have attended a previous AFX, it is a great time away, as it is for most of the recruit cadets. However, for some of these young ones, it is their first time away from home, and/or their first time in a 'camping' environment. I use that word 'camping' loosely because it's not like a typical camping holiday like one might expect. They are out of their comfort zone.

Another factor to throw into the mix is that people are allocated into groups for the week. So it may well be likely that a person finds themselves in a group with 9 or 10 people they don't know. Older cadets will often say one of the highlights of being involved in the program is getting to meet people from around the state and making friends with people they would otherwise not know or meet. I am sure, though, you could imagine for a 12 or 13 year old this could be quite daunting, being in a group with others, none of whom they know at the start. Obviously, as the week progresses, this changes.

It will likely be a busy week for me and the two other chaplains I will be with. Having described the above, there will be a number of these recruit and junior cadets who will come with varying degrees of anxiety and homesickness. Then, add to this, other cadets who have got other issues going on in their life which are weighing them down and are a not far from the front of their minds.

We all feel anxious and uncertain about one thing or another at times. Being anxious keeps us alert and thinking and can be a good thing when kept in check. Sometimes, though, anxiety can become debilitating; for some, to the point it becomes a mental health illness. It can affect a person's functioning and their ability to get on with day to day life, lasting over a long period of time. This is not normal, and requires appropriate professional help and support to manage and resolve.

As I reflect on what my week ahead will hold, I am reminded of different Bible passages. I wonder what it was like for the twelve that Jesus called to follow him, leaving behind family, and family responsibilities and obligations, to become wandering itinerants. I imagine they had anxious moments as they found themselves outside of their comfort zones. Even with Jesus, who became a rock for them, they had their moments of insecurities and doubts in some of the situations they found themselves in. I'm thinking of the accounts of them in the boat with Jesus when the wind and waves are such that they are being tossed about to the point of fearing for their life!

I am reminded that faith doesn't promise or provide us with a plain-sailing life; one free from worry or anxiety. It does, however, provide us with a source of support than can be calming and comforting in difficult times. The words of Jesus to his troubled and anxious disciples in John 14 resound in my mind: "Peace I leave with you. My peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. So do not let your hearts be troubled. Do not be afraid."
