FROM THE MINISTER

What emotions does Christmas give rise to in you?

I recently read an article by Lisa A. Williams, Associate Professor in the School of Psychology at the University of New South Wales, published in 'The Conversation' online newsletter. A not-for-profit company, 'The Conversation' provides independent, research-based news and analysis through a collaboration between academics and



journalists. The article was titled, 'What COVID has taught us about sharing our emotions – and why now's a good time to share again'.

Williams says, "It's no surprise most Australians reported lowered mental wellbeing since the onset of the pandemic." The article continues with self-reported data gathered from social media networks that underscores the increase in issues and problems associated with mental health and wellbeing.

It notes that during the first waves of the pandemic with lockdowns, density restrictions, mask mandates, border closures, and everything else that came with it, people longed for their usual social interactions, freedom of movement, and a return to 'normality'. People's stress and emotions were high. Everyone was affected in one way or another. While there were differences, there was a collective emotional response. People generally openly shared their emotional response.

Speaking of the emotional response to Covid, words such as gloom, melancholy, despair, loneliness, and depression come to mind. These are a subset of what is said to be one of the primary emotions: sadness. Depending on who or where you read, some say there are four primary emotions (happiness, sadness, fear, anger), some say six, others say eight (anger, anticipation, joy, trust, fear, surprise, sadness and disgust).

The article headline made me think - what does Christmas teach us about our emotions? What does it teach us about those who first started to tell the Christmas story? What does it tell us of the people of ancient Israel, the generations of people who lived before the birth of Jesus?

Simply speaking, as Christians we celebrate Christmas to mark the birth of Jesus. We reflect on the beliefs behind Christmas and how the symbolism of the celebration connects us to the past and calls us to look to the future.

For the ancient Israelites who found themselves living in exile there was a longing desire and hope for better times; times they might have described as 'normal' - a return to what life was like pre-exile. I suspect it was out of this that writings which expressed the anticipation and longing for a messiah began to emerge. Jesus was, for his earliest followers and the Christian communities which emerged in due course, the fulfilment of these longings. In and through Jesus emerges joy and trust and continuing anticipation.

Perhaps it is not so much a question of what does Christmas teach us about our emotions, but what emotions does Christmas give rise to in us? In you? Depending on individual circumstances, any of the emotions may be triggered for you. Whichever way it is you might answer the question, I wish Gods peace, shalom, which passes all understanding, to be with and within you as we recall again the coming of the Christ-child this Christmas season. In sharing our emotions with one another, may we surround and support each other.

The first Sunday in Advent marks the beginning of the Christian Year. It is a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus.


* Service of Lessons & Carols
