FROM THE MINISTER "How to make a fire – a parable"

Building a good fire begins with understanding the right conditions, to know when it is favourable. Watching the weather before you go, choosing a nice sunny day out of fire season is a great start. Then it's finding the right location, clearing the ground



and making space so the fire stays in the place where it is needed. It needs to be a safe place for everything and everyone. Most times, there has already been a fire at a campsite, so it makes sense to use what's there, unless it is not fit for purpose.

You need to select the right kindling and wood to burn. It all depends on where you are and what is around. You need to know your surroundings. The best way to gather wood is when you have enough light and time. It takes time to collect the wood, depending on the landscape. If it's quite barren, you might need to walk for a bit to find something you can use. You need time to scope out opportunities to finding some good firewood, and it is best collecting it during the day rather than scrounging around after dark. As you walk, keep your attention to what is in front of you, stay focused on what is at hand. You need to collect enough wood to keep the fire going for as long as you have purpose for it, long after it gets dark, so it gets you to the morning.

The wood needs to be as dry as you can get it. The more wet it is the more smoke it produces, which limits how many people can be around the fire. Smoke can blind people's eyes for a time, cause them the cough, choke and splutter. Sometimes after a face full of smoke, a person may never return to a fire, even if there is warmth. So don't throw anything green on the fire, or wood that is soaked through, it needs time to dry out to be ready.

The bigger pieces you choose, that produce nice coals, lie at the base of the big gum trees, thick dead branches which are slow burning, efficient and last for hours. These are long standing landmarks that will always provide for you each time you visit.

To light the flame you need to shelter the spark from the wind. I start building a cone shape, with smaller pieces to larger pieces of kindling on the outside, gradually getting it bigger with enough room to place my hand in to light the fire at the base. I use my body, and other's if they are with me, to make a wind break, so the flame can take hold and burn on its own. You can't start a fire with a big log and a matchstick. A fire needs to be built up overtime.

Tending the fire, requires a watchful eye. Place logs on to maintain the same light and heat that is required. Placing too little will see the fire die down, and placing too much on at one time can either create an uncontrollable fire, or more often, starve the fire of oxygen and put it out. You need to make space for the fire to breathe.

Making camp and setting up a fire requires planning, and maintaining a fire requires a gentle persistence. It's good to have a group of people to help and share the warmth. A campfire is a place where we can all gather and appreciate the warmth and light. A fire draws people together.

But be warned. It only takes one spark to destroy a campsite. You are responsible for the fire, from the moment it starts, to when it is extinguished. A fire should not be left to burn out by itself, so if leaving a campsite where there is no responsible camper to take it on, completely extinguish your fire, stir up the coals and douse them with water and dirt.

Always leave the campsite better than when you found it, for the next travellers who visit the spot. Take your rubbish with you. In this way, a campsite can only improve.

I wonder what principles we can apply to our lives and for the church as we journey together. What if we replace 'fire' with mission, ministry, or church? What if we replace 'wood' with ideas, dreams and concepts? What if the big logs are scripture, reason, tradition and experience? What does this tell us about starting and finishing things well?
