# FROM THE MINISTER

There is a true story I have read recently about a mother preparing her daughter for her first day in reception. Her mother drives her daughter to school, and takes her into class, sitting up the back with the other parents as her daughter takes a seat on the floor besides the other reception kids. During class, the teacher hands out a blank sheet of paper, and invites each child to write her



name with their favourite-coloured crayon up on the desk. All the other kids start writing their name, but this mother's daughter does not.

She seems to be locked in position, at the table, staring at the crayons. Now, her mother knows that her daughter can write her name, in fact, she can write the name of her brothers, sisters and cousins. It takes all she has not to walk through the middle of class to her daughter to ask what is going on. The teacher comes across and gently encourages the girl to write with no success, and the teacher says, "don't worry, it's alright, we will teach you how to write your name."

The daughter sits with the blank sheet in front of her for the rest of the lesson. At the end of class, the mother takes her daughter home. On the way home, the mother asks gently why her daughter didn't write her name on the paper. The daughter replied, the teacher asked me to write in my favourite colour, which is pink, but there was no pink crayon in my pack. I couldn't write my name because my favourite colour wasn't there.

Sometimes, in our lives, we can get stuck. A situation comes up that just stops everything. We miss out on getting a spot in a sporting team, we've been working hard to achieve a goal but now it is out of reach. We had a plan and it's fallen through. We want our favourite colour but it's not on offer. Nothing has worked out quite like we had planned. The wind is knocked out of your sails, all momentum is lost and you're just drifting. You can get a hard knock, and now it's taking a while to get up again. The rug has been pulled out from under your feet. You've failed to live up to expectations.

These are all great metaphors and sayings, and they are often used because it is the human experience. It's an experience we all have felt at some time in our lives.

Not everything works out the way we want it to. Not everything falls into place, not everything makes sense, or is fair. I wonder if you have been in this place. I wonder if you are in this place now?

When we think of the Apostle Paul and his struggles through his life, there is a resolve, a hope, an assurance that while we face trouble, failure, depression, anxiety or despair at this moment, this season will not last forever, there are better days ahead. "We are often troubled, but not crushed; sometimes in doubt, but never in despair; there are many enemies, but we are never without a friend; and though badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed." *2 Corinthians 4: 8-9* 

When faced with a bump in the road, sometimes we forget we have a choice: overcome the obstacle or let it overcome you. We all have obstacles we face, we all face hard times. Don't give up. Persist. You may not have the opportunity to write your name with your favourite colour. But you still have other colours, other opportunities, other ways to write your name, to change the world.

The difficult things we endure are sometimes really painful and hard. May those times eventually cease and produce the results we desire. May God teach us to always trust and hope as He helps and guides us through life's lessons. May God help us to consistently see that times that test our resilience produce the persistence we will need throughout our lives. May God allow us to realize that our continual perseverance leads to maturity and the strength of character that can face any storm. May God give us strength, give us hope, so we may endure every obstacle we face.

Kent Town and the Kent Town Residents' Association were approached jointly by UniSA to find retired residents to participate with Social Work Students and their Supervisors in a Life Stories Project. Four of our Wednesday 'Community Connections' morning tea attendees have joined the project. It involves several visits by 2 students, one who interviews, one who 'scribes' the story. The stories are compiled by the students in a booklet or a story-board poster-style – which can include photographs along with the person's life story (whatever you want included). Students hold current

safety clearances and are well supervised. They gain experience in speaking with and working with older residents in our community. The retired person receives a story of their life and an experience connecting with students which helps them in their training.
